**Bernard van Leer Foundation** is an international grant-making foundation based in The Hague. Through their grant-making programs they pioneer innovative ways to improve opportunities for disadvantaged young children. Through their free publications they share what they learn with practitioners and policy makers and shape the debate about early childhood care and education. GFC offers grants to organizations and programs that focus on learning, enterprise, safety, and healthy minds and bodies. The organization also offers a Global Media Venture that develops multicultural books, documents the work of grant recipients through photography, and supports films that focus on the challenges of children around the world. **Half the Sky Foundation** nurtures and supports orphaned children in China. The organization operates infant nurture and preschool programs, provides personalized learning for older children, and establishes permanent family care and guidance for children with disabilities. **Pennies for Peace** is an international service-learning program from the Central Asia Institute, founded by Greg Mortenson. The program, which supports educational opportunities for children in Pakistan and Afghanistan, features a K–12 curriculum, links to standards with an assessment tool, an implementation guide, fact sheets, postcards, and videos.
