In addition to my work for HighScope, I have contributed to the field of early childhood in other capacities as well. I have been involved with many agencies that help shape the future of early childhood, such as The National Black Child Development Institute, The Early Learning Alliance, and the NAEYC Accreditation Council as Chair. In 2020 I was awarded the Exchange Leadership award and I have written several articles centering around Social and Emotional Learning, Social Justice, and supporting boys of color in preschool. It's easy to say that my passion for early childhood education has impacted, and will continue to impact, the field for generations to come.
